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What is Mitigation?



"Mitigation" - A sustained action taken to reduce or eliminate long term risk to life and property from a hazard event

-or -

Any action taken to reduce future disaster losses

Subapplicant Eligibility

- State agencies and local communities/governments
- Individuals & Businesses are not eligible
 - Eligible subapplicants can apply on their behalf
- FEMA Approved Hazard Mitigation Plan
 - By application deadline & at the time funding is obligated
 - · If part of the County plan, you must officially adopt it
- Projects must be consistent with Mitigation Actions in your HMP



Flood Mitigation Assistance

Provides federal funding to states, local communities, tribes and territories (SLTTs) to reduce or eliminate the risk of repetitive flood damage to buildings and structures insured under the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP).

Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities (BRIC)

 Previously known as Pre-Disaster Mitigation (PDM)

 Aids eligible applicants to implement & sustain cost-effective measures designed to reduce the risk to individuals and property.

- 75% Federal/25% Non-Federal Cost Share
 - 25% is responsibility of sub-applicant
 - 25% may be cash or "in-kind" services

BRIC Priorities

- Encourage public infrastructure projects
- Increase projects that mitigate risk to one or more lifelines
- Promote projects that incorporate nature-based solutions
- Incentivize adoption and enforcement of modern building codes

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BRIC Funding Limit

HMA FY 20 What does it mean for Delaware?

- State/Territory Maximum Allocation and Activity Caps: \$600,000
 - Up to \$300,000 may be used for mitigation planning and planning-related activities per applicant
- Tribal Set-Aside Activity Caps: The combined cost of the applicant's capability- and- capacity building activities under the Tribal Set-Aside must not exceed \$600,000 per applicant
- National Competition Project Cap: \$50 million per subapplication



How is BRIC different than PDM?

Sets Clear Priorities

- Lifelines & infrastructure projects
- Building codes
- Shared responsibility & partnerships
- Innovative projects

Builds Capability

- Capability & capacity-building activities
- In-person, nonfinancial, technical assistance
- The Mitigation Action Portfolio – selection of case studies

Increases Flexibility

- Reduces limitations
- Increases caps
- Allows preaward costs

Streamlines Processes

- New application process through FEMA GO
- Project extensions
- Phased projects

Hazard Mitigation Assistance Guidance

Hazard Mitigation Grant Program, Pre-Disaster Mitigation Program, and Flood Mitigation Assistance Program February 27, 2015



Federal Emergency Management Agency Department of Homeland Security 500 C Street, S.W.

Expanded Eligibility Includes:

- Project scoping
- Building code activities
- Pre-award costs
- Additional activities for wildfire and wind implementation (DRRA Section 1205)
- Earthquake early
 warning (DRRA Section 1233)

Projects Must:

- Be cost-effective
- Reduce/eliminate risk and damage from future natural hazards
- Meet latest two consensus codes (i.e., 2015 or 2018 international building code)
- Align with Hazard Mitigation Plan
- Meet all environmental and historic preservation requirements




BRIC Phased Projects – Is it Possible in Delaware?

- Phased projects are where FEMA provides funding for complex mitigation projects.
- Phasing projects allow good mitigation projects to be developed and evaluated without a community assuming risk of not being funded, which can be especially helpful for smaller communities.

FY 20 Grant Cycle Timeline

November 20, 2020	Deadline for sub-applicants to submit application drafts to DEMA
December 7-11, 2020	Internal application review process
December 14, 2020	Subapplications released for revisions
December 31, 2020	Final deadline for subapplications to be submitted to DEMA
January 13, 2021	Application Review Session by SHMC Policy Group
January 25, 2021	Internal deadline for Delaware's application submitted to FEMA
January 29, 2021	FEMA's deadline for application submission
